# From the Archives High Above the Plant

This daring gentleman seems to be putting the finishing touches on two of the three smokestacks at the Sego Milk Plant probably around its opening in 1916. The smokestacks were for the boilers that processed the evaporated milk and other products that were shipped nationwide and for the war effort during World War II. At the bottom of the photo are the Southern Pacific Railroad tracks and on the other side is the Peerless Mill that sold livestock feed. On the wall of the "Mill" are advertisements for Bull Durham Tobacco and the Whitaker and Ray Store on Fourth Street. Judging by the condition of the smokestacks, painting was one of the final steps to completion. The plant closed in 1961 and was then consumed by fire in 1993. The photographer was probably standing on the water tower to the west which is the only thing left standing.

### Liberty School House Donation

I have spoken with the City Planning Department regarding the move of the Liberty School House from Fourth Street to the Rae Museum. They have been very helpful and supportive, and they want this piece of our history to live on at the museum. They are working on the best route with the mover to get it to Oak Street. The picture of the schoolhouse shows on the left side of the addon that has to be removed going back 25 feet to the back side. The back side is about 19 feet that has to be removed also.

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### Policy and Procedure Review

### **Contracts**

#### Purpose:

In order to be clear about the intent of both the GAHS and other parties with whom the Society enters into relationships, written contracts are frequently necessary. Well-executed written contracts clarify and define the agreement between the parties and protect against unnecessary risks to the Society's resources and reputation. This policy provides guidance for the development and use of written contracts. It was taken mostly from GAHS Resolution 2010-1 dated April 8,2010.

#### II. Policy:

- 1. All contracts, work agreements, repair agreements, or any other type service agreement, and/or any project commitment for the Society, regardless of cost involved, must be presented to the Executive Officers for approval prior to any project or service(s) being implemented. The Society President must sign any and all such agreements after approval of the officers.
- 2. All such agreements shall be outlined in detail for services to be provided with separate listing of labor and materials.
- 3. As required by Internal Revenue Service regulations, all providers of services costing \$600 or more will be required to complete and submit Form W-9, Request for Taxpayer identification and Certification, prior to payment. No payment will be processed without this form.
- 4. All contracts with vendors or contractors that are hired to perform services must have a term requiring proof of Workers 'Compensation and General Liability Insurance. In addition, the GAHS should be named as an "additional insured" on the vendor or contractor's General. Liability policy to protect the Society in the event the Society is named In a suit arising from the other party's negligence.
- 5. All contracts with vendors or contractors that are hired to perform services must have a term requiring proof of a Contractor's License.

## Louise's Walk Down Memory Lane

There are subjects people of Galt have no idea they existed and I seriously doubt no one besides myself knows these. On the corner of 5th and B streets was a livery stable. One could rest horses and carriages. It was a two story building. Since I do not know if there are any descendants still alive I will not mention names. The owner of the building was married to a very respectable lady school teacher. This building housed all the needs of a livery stable on the first level. On the 2nd level was a very active brothel. The owner was said to be its' best customer. Divorces were very rare. He wasn't very secretive. Brothels were common. Even in the 1930's ladies wouldn't walk down J street in Sacramento below 6th street. The "ladies" dressed well and walked down the streets to work. They didn't mingle with respectable society though. World War II seemed to put a stop to them. History has many subjects. There are many and not all are pleasant to remember.

### School Bus Days 1932-1937

These were fun when Mr. Altnow drove. His route covered Schimmern Road east and south - when 99 highway was built the SCH - was dropped and Simmerhorn was the name they used. A sign was put up at the corner of 4th & C pointing towards Highway 99 SACTO. Boessow Road was Basso. People let the highway know about names and errors in spelling, but Simmerhorn was not corrected.

## Galt's Connection to Las Vegas




Do you know how conversations can evolve from one subject to another, and you look back on it and laugh at how you got there? That happens to me while researching different topics that I find interesting. While doing some filing in the Archives, I came across an 1882 newspaper clipping stating that the Galt Odd Fellows would be observing the 63rd anniversary of Odd Fellowship in America by having a picnic at Wiser Grove. Wiser Grove? I've never heard of it. We know that early Galt citizens picnicked at Harvey Grove a mile west of Galt and later White Bridges out on Twin Cities Road, but Wiser Grove was a new one. My curiosity got the best of me so naturally, I had to investigate.

After a little digging, the name Hiram Wiser popped up. He and his wife Delia had a brood of five children, Helen, Rachel, Asenath, Henry, and Flora. In the 1880s, the Wisers owned a ranch outside of Galt but lived in a two-story house in town (as a side note, the lumber for the house came "around the Horn"). Hiram was a member of the Odd Fellows which makes sense and Delia was on the Board of Directors of the Galt Water Company. What caught my eye was the Wiser's oldest daughter Helen. She is considered the "First Lady of Las Vegas, Nevada."

Helen married Stocktonian Archibald Stewart, and they moved to the Las Vegas Valley in Nevada. Stewart had loaned someone money and acquired property through default on the loan. After Archibald Stewart's murder (that story is quite lengthy), Helen's father Hiram Wiser took over operation of the ranch while Helen went back to Galt to give birth to her last child. Helen and her father then switched places where Helen added to her holdings and eventually became the largest landowner in Lincoln County, Nevada (where Las Vegas now stands). Add first Las Vegas Postmaster to her resume, and you have one of Nevada's early pioneers. What about Wiser Grove? We're still trying to figure out where it was located.

## Galt Pioneer Cemetery Tour

Sounds interesting, right? There's only one requirement with a Galt Cemetery Tour, the people listed must be buried in the Galt Cemetery! A few of them are not.

One would think that the person who had the idea and did most of the work to bring Galt into existence would find a place in the Galt Cemetery, but Dr. Obed Harvey has his burial site in the Sacramento City Cemetery. The first person to build a wood frame building in Dry Creek Township (before Galt's founding) was Dr. William McIntyre. His wife is buried in Galt, but he is buried in Ogden, Utah (there's another story here). John Brewster owned the Brewster

Building on 4th Street and built a house behind it on 5th Street, but we find him in the Liberty Cemetery. Who will be on the Galt Cemetery Tour of Early Pioneers?

Those selected will include John McCauley, one of the early large landowners in the Chabolla Land Grant and John McFarland, a wheat farmer, builder, and the man who named the town. Andrew Whitaker and Don Ray were early developers and merchants as were George May and Thomas Swift Ferguson. Immigrants and farmers Charles Ambrogio and Amadeo Lippi will be on the list as well as George Need and Samuel Wriston. Did I mention night watchman and former US Marshall Bee Mellon? We have quite a menu.
